






'Every time it rains': Floods from climate change plague a Camden neighborhood



The Stormwater Problem

Climate Change

- On average, a homeowner could expect to endure a 100-year storm during a 30-year mortgage.
- Precipitation is already 2.5% to 10% higher.
- Our flood maps are based on 1999 data.



Impervious Surface


- + Increased impervious surface

Increased flooding




Combined Sewer Overflows

- There are 21 CSO communities with over 200 outfalls.
- They are located exclusively in overburdened communities.





CSO Impacts

Direct exposure can cause:

 cholera, typhoid, hepatitis, polio, cryptosporidiosis, ascariasis and schistosomiasis.


Indirect exposure can cause:

 ear and eye discharges, skin rashes, gastrointestinal problems and even miscarriages.



Stormwater Management in NJ

 New Jersey has a \$16 billion stormwater infrastructure problem, and right now there is no dedicated funding source to address this massive need.

What Are My Options?



- Do Nothing
- Increase Property Taxes
- Increase Sewer Rates
- Create a Stormwater Utility



Similar to a water or sewer utility, a stormwater utility is a local assessment district that dedicates funding specifically and solely to address stormwater management problems.

STATE MANDATE:

- Clean Stormwater and Flood Reduction Act, S-1073 is Permissive
- Localities decide whether to create a stormwater utility

Equitable Funding

- Fee is based off of amount of impervious surface a property
- Credits can be gained for commercial and residential properties through implementing solutions like rain barrels and rain gardens
- Tailored to the town


